Snakes – Stop, Look and Listen

Florida has snakes, and Mentone has its share. We have to learn to live with them, and the trick is to be able to identify the nasty ones. The bottom line is just leave them alone! Snakes are active in spring, so learn a bit about "when to hold 'em and when to run."

Florida has six venomous snake species, only four of which can be found in our area: the <u>Eastern diamondback</u>, the <u>pygmy rattler</u>, the <u>cottonmouth</u> or water moccasin, and the <u>coral snake</u>.

Although our poisonous snakes are normally non aggressive, they will all strike in self-defense if they feel threatened, and they will feel that way if you accidentally grasp one in your garden, or corner one, or step on one. All except the coral snake are extremely well camouflaged by their natural markings. As a help in identifying snakes, *no North American venomous snake is clearly striped from head to tail.*

THE BADDIES:


The Eastern Diamondback Rattlesnake is large and heavy bodied with a row of large dark diamonds with brown centers and cream borders down its back. The ground color of the body is brownish. Average adult size is 36-72 inches and it can accurately strike up to 2/3 its body length. It can lay silent and motionless, and then strike without the usual nervous buzz from its rattle.

The Dusky Pygmy Rattlesnake is small (12-24 inches) but thick. The body is light to dark gray with a row of black or charcoal blotches disrupting a reddish brown stripe down the middle of the back and dark spots on the side. The tail is slender and ends in a small rattle. The belly is heavily mottled with black and white.

The Cottonmouth, commonly known as the Water Moccasin, is an evil-looking, heavy-bodied, thick-headed snake averaging 20-48 inches. Juveniles are brightlycolored with reddish-brown bands on a brown field, but the pattern darkens with age to appear almost black. They can be found anywhere, including far from water. When threatened, the Cottonmouth will often coil its March, 2012

body and open its mouth, revealing a white interior. Its bite can be quite dangerous and needs prompt medical attention.

The Eastern Coral Snake, a relative of the cobra, is most notable for its red, yellow/white, and black colored banding. This non-aggressive snake is the only neurotoxic member of our indigenous poisonous snakes. Adults average 20-30 inches. They are quite secretive, usually found under debris and in the ground, and generally bite humans only when handled or stepped on. There are several colorful, banded, non-venomous snakes that can be mistaken for the Coral Snake, hence the mnemonic "red next to yellow – kill a fellow; red on black – friend of Jack" which helps get the color sequence right. Coral snakes have jet black noses, another way to identify them.



Every other band **is** yellow, and Yellow does not touch red, and yellow touches both black and every other band **is not** yellow. red, but black and red never touch.

There are a few very common non-venomous snakes which are very often misidentified as venomous – these are the harmless ones: <u>yellow</u> and <u>red rat snakes</u>, <u>black</u> <u>racers</u> and several types of <u>water snakes</u>, particularly the <u>banded water snake</u>, the <u>brown water snake</u> and the <u>green water snake</u>.
